Job: Intervention Specialist: Moderate to intense

How long have you been at this job?: "I have been at Monroe for 3 years; my first year was with mild children, and my second and third year has been with moderate to intense children."

What do you like about this job?: "I love the kids that I work with and my co-workers. I have a great classroom and the kids are great every year."

What is challenging?: "Having the expectations from the state that we have to meet. With the children's abilities, it can be challenging. Just all the expectations!"

How is the job rewarding?: "Seeing the growth definitely. Even if it is baby steps, any growth is amazing. Seeing a student decrease in bad habits and increase in good habits, is so rewarding."

What has changed in the profession in the last 5-10 years?: "State expectations, just because in the past they wouldn't have been pushed to take classes, the other students are taking. For example, the electives."

What is continuing to change?: "Student expectations and IEP's of the student."

What do you expect to change in the 5-10 years?: "Getting evaluated by the state may go away in the next few years. When we have to get videoed; I think that might go away completely."

What sort of training/education did you need for this job?: "I had a degree in business, went to college, got a masters degree and complete so many professional development hours a year."

Has the job market changed? If so, in what way(s)?: "I haven't really looked, but there may be more openings for jobs, so a higher demand."

Was it difficult to find work? If so, in what ways?: "It wasn't difficult for me; this was the 2nd place I interviewed. I think it just depends on the openings."

Do you think the job market will change?: "Yes, I think there will be more demand for teachers because of the drop in wanting to go into the field of teaching. There will be more of a need for the jobs."

What advice would you give someone just entering this fields?: "Stay on top of IEP's, be organized, get IEP's done early, planning ahead helps a lot, remember everyday is a new day; it can be challenging, so stay positive."

How should I prepare to enter this field?: "Look into colleges known for this program. Xavier has a great program as well as UC. Know a cooperating teacher that you could shadow. Schedule a lot of job shadows, so you know exactly what it is like."

What do I need to know in order to be successful in this field?: "Knowing different disabilities so when new kids come in you know the reason. Having a relationship with the parents. Looking and having knowledge about the child his/herself. Also know the law."

What about child psychology? Have you ever thought about that?: "Actually, I started out with a major of psychology. Look into OT jobs!"
